Tech Talk

Thelma

This is the name of a movie doing the rounds of the cinemas (and likely to show up on a streaming service soon). *Thelma* stars 95-year-old June Squibb as Thelma Post and is inspired by the writer/director's experience of an attempted scam on his grandmother. I won't elaborate on the plot except to say it deals with Thelma being scammed out of \$10 000 and her attempts to recover the money. There are some interesting learnings from the movie regarding the scam.

- 1. Don't panic. Panic/fright/anxiety are the scammer's best friends. In the movie Thelma receives a phone call supposedly from her grandson who has been in an accident. There are many similar scams doing the rounds. They centre on a phone call/text/email from a loved one in a dire situation who needs money rapidly. While any such contact will spark alarm try not to give in to the panic the scammer is hoping to create.
- 2. Do not give out information. Thelma provides information to the scammer about her grandson. This is information that could be used later. If someone is asking for personal details always ensure you have confirmation of who they are. If they want information then they must provide information information only the bona fide caller would have. I received a phone call from my insurance company regarding a claim I had made. They wanted me to confirm my details (full name, address, date of birth... the usual drill). But how do we know the caller is who they say? I asked them to provide the claim number which I had in front of me. Only when they could provide information I had and they should know, was I prepared to give information. Never provide information (no matter how innocuous it may seem) to anyone unless you are certain you know who it is and what it will be used for.
- 3. Confirm the identity. This relates to the above. In the movie, Thelma notes that the caller does not sound like her grandson. The scammer explains this by stating he has a cold. In these days of AI and 'deep fake' technology it is possible to create believable fakes of voices and even images/video. Be suspicious if the call/text is not coming from the number in your contacts. Attempt to contact your loved one (even if you have been told they have lost their phone). Another strategy that could be used is to decide on a family code word or phrase which can be used in a call or text to confirm their identity.

Unfortunately scams are not going to go away. And they are likely to become more subtle and clever. You must remain on your guard with your scepticism dial turned to 11 (*Spinal Tap* reference). And if you get a chance, Thelma is worth a view.

Ken's Tip – Cleaning your Screen

You should not clean your tablet with house cleaners such as Windex. But specialised cleaners are quite expensive (\$12 up for a kit).

You can get excellent results with a home-made cleaner. Mix half and half isopropyl alcohol (from Bunnings) and de -mineralised water (at any supermarket) in a container and use it to refill a glasses cleaner spray bottle (from any optometrist). Spray on the screen and wipe off with a tissue. (at one time, I recommended a microfibre cloth but modern Gorilla glass is quite OK with a tissue).

If you want to clean a PC or TV screen, which do not have Gorilla glass, you should use water with a drop of dishwashing detergent on a microfibre cloth - Woolworth's Home Brand Anti-Bacterial cloth (\$1.99 for two) is very good for the purpose

My AI Experience

In last month's newsletter I included a Tech Talk article on artificial intelligence (AI), largely written by AIs. But what could they do in practice? These is my findings.

I have recently used AI to draft my Potty Histories – they generate schoolkid level essays (high school level if I choose Chat GPT), frequently containing extensive verbatim text from Wikipedia. I then add in the pottiness and excise the dull bits of the AI essay. (My previous process had been to find a subject from the recesses of my brain and extract the fun parts from the appropriate Wikipedia articles).

Aside from this I have spent time this year building an Excel package to take input from our training programme and present it in formats that can be dropped straight into both the newsletter and our website. This will assist not just me but also my successors. Microsoft's Copilot AI gave me some useful hints - but not solutions – in this endeavour.

Most recently I have been designing a post processer for the Excel package to superscript the ordinal date suffixes (eg replace 1st with 1st) since Excel doesn't use superscript fonts. Using Microsoft Word's Replace command doesn't work because it will not limit its action to dates – it also changes other words (eg August to August). So I asked Chat GPT to create macro code to do the task, and to my surprise, once I had appropriately phrased my requirement, it offered me a fully functional solution. It even included a user guide!

Potty History

Saint Nicholas of Myra

I was introduced to Saint Nicholas by singing in Benjemin Britten's cantata with the Cambrian choir. According to the text he was a remarkable man. This is my take on his legend. Ed

Nicholas was a 4th-century Christian bishop from the region of Lycia in Asia Minor (modern-day southern Turkey), is one of the most venerated saints in both Eastern and Western Christianity. His life has become enshrouded in legend, primarily due to the stories of his miracles and acts of charity. However, Nicholas is perhaps best known for his association with the modern-day figure of Santa Claus.

Although precise details of Saint Nicholas' life are scarce, most accounts agree that he was born in the city of Patara around 270AD. Orphaned at a young age, Nicholas inherited significant wealth from his parents, which he later used to help the poor. Known for his piety and generosity, he quickly gained a reputation for performing miracles, defending the oppressed, and caring for children.

Saint Nicholas' reputation as a miracle worker is one of the main reasons for his enduring veneration. His miracles are wide-ranging, but four stand out for their significance and their role in shaping his legacy.

1. The Rescue of Three Innocent Men

One of the earliest recorded miracles of Saint Nicholas is his intervention in the case of three men who were falsely condemned to death. According to legend, the men were wrongly accused and about to be executed when Nicholas learned of their plight. He rushed to the scene, intervening just in time to stop the execution. Nicholas is said to have confronted the local governor, exposed the injustice and convinced him to free the men. This miracle cemented Nicholas' reputation as a defender of justice and protector of the innocent.

2. The Miracle of the Dowries

Perhaps the most famous miracle attributed to Saint Nicholas is his saving of three impoverished sisters from lives of destitution. According to tradition, the sisters' father was too poor to provide them with dowries, a necessity for marriage at the time. Without dowries, the sisters faced the prospect of being sold into slavery or forced into prostitution. Upon hearing of their situation, Nicholas decided to help anonymously. On three separate occasions, Nicholas threw bags of gold coins through the family's window (or in some versions, down the chimney), providing the dowries needed for each sister to marry. This act of generosity and compassion solidified his reputation as a benefactor to the poor and is a key to his transformation into the modern figure of Santa Claus, with the image of gifts being secretly delivered during the night.

3. The Miracle of the Sailors

Another prominent miracle associated with Saint Nicholas involves his protection of sailors during a sea voyage bringing Nicolas to Palestine. During this voyage, a mighty storm assails the ship, perhaps as punishment to the faithless sailors who have mocked the pious saint. The storm is terrifying, and the crew despair. Amidst the violent winds, waves, and rain, Nicolas gathers the sailors in prayer, and the storm subsides. Saint Nicholas became the patron saint of sailors and travellers, with seafarers in particular invoking his name for protection during dangerous voyages.

4. The Pickled Boys

While travelling around his diocese Nicolas finds himself in an inn where a group of travellers have paused for the night. They invite the bishop to dine with them, but Nicolas stops them from eating, realising that the meat that they eat is in fact the flesh of three boys murdered and pickled by the butcher. Nicolas calls to the boys, "Timothy, Mark, and John, put your fleshly garments on!" and the boys come back to life, singing "Alleluia!". Many of the images of Nicholas include the boys standing in the pickling vat.

5. The Diverted Grain

During a great famine that Myra experienced in 311–312, a ship was in the port at anchor, loaded with wheat for the emperor in Constantinople. Nicholas invited the sailors to unload a part of the wheat to help in the time of need. The sailors at first disliked the request, because the wheat had to be weighed accurately and delivered to

the emperor. Only when Nicholas promised them that they would not suffer any loss for their consideration did the sailors agree. When they arrived later in the capital, they made a surprising find: the weight of the load had not changed, although the wheat removed in Myra was enough for two full years and could even be used for sowing.

Saint Nicholas' reputation for generosity and his association with gift-giving created the foundation for his transformation into Santa Claus. This transformation was gradual and varied between cultures, but it was rooted in the celebration of his feast day on December 6th, a day on which many European Christians would exchange gifts in his honour.

1. The Dutch Influence: Sinterklaas

The Dutch played a crucial role in the evolution of Saint Nicholas into Santa Claus. In the Netherlands, Saint Nicholas became known as "Sinterklaas," a figure who would arrive by boat from Spain on the eve of his feast day, delivering presents to well-behaved children and leaving coal or potatoes for those who misbehaved. Dutch settlers brought the tradition of Sinterklaas to America in the 17th century, where it began to merge with other cultural influences.

2. The American Santa Claus


The transformation of Sinterklaas into the modern American Santa Claus was cemented in the 19th century, thanks to the influence of several writers and artists. The 1823 poem "A Visit from St. Nicholas" (better known as "The Night Before Christmas") by Clement Clarke Moore helped to popularize the image of a jolly, rotund man who travels by sleigh on Christmas Eve, delivering presents to children all over the world. This depiction was further solidified by the famous illustrations of Thomas Nast, a 19th-century political cartoonist, who added elements such as the red suit and the North Pole residence to the image of Santa Claus.


3. Commercialization and Global Spread

By the early 20th century, Santa Claus had become an integral part of Christmas celebrations in the United States, and his image spread around the world through literature, advertising, and media. Coca-Cola's advertising campaigns in the 1930s played a major role in popularizing the modern image of Santa Claus, presenting him as the familiar figure dressed in red, with a white beard and a cheerful demeanour. This commercialized version of Santa Claus became a symbol of the holiday season, transcending religious and cultural boundaries.
