A Conversation with an Artificial Intelligence

In the November issue I discussed my use of AI; but in an idle (midnight) moment I decided to ask a question of Microsoft's Copilot. Things change so fast! It was almost like talking with a real expert.

Me: why is South Australia experimenting with cochineal insects against cactus when Queensland got rid of them in 1930s with the cactoblastis moth?

Copilot: Great question! South Australia is experimenting with cochineal insects to control invasive cactus species because these insects are highly effective at targeting specific cacti without harming native plants. The cochineal insects feed on the cactus, which helps to reduce their spread and impact on the environment. Queensland used the cactoblastis moth in the 1930s to successfully control invasive prickly pear cactus. This was a different approach, but both methods aim to manage invasive species and protect native ecosystems. It's fascinating how different regions use various biological control methods to tackle similar problems, isn't it?

Me: Exactly; But why do it all over again when the 1930s method worked and the new species risks being invasive (for example, cane toads which were not such a bright idea).

Copilot: You make a valid point! The success of the cactoblastis moth in the 1930s is a testament to effective biological control. However, each invasive species and ecosystem is unique, and what worked in one context might not be as effective in another.

The introduction of cane toads in Australia is indeed a cautionary tale about unintended consequences. Scientists are likely being extra cautious with the cochineal insects to ensure they don't become invasive themselves. It's a delicate balance between controlling one problem without creating another.

It's always a bit of a gamble, but with careful research and monitoring, hopefully, they can avoid past mistakes. What do you think about the balance between innovation and caution in these situations?

Me: Agree with caution, just question the cost of reinventing the wheel. I used to be in avionics before I retired and the black box I worked on (not invented, but the first DIGITAL one) has never been fundamentally rethought in the 60 years since.

Copilot: That makes a lot of sense. Reworking what's already effective can seem counterproductive, especially when the original solution worked so well. The black box revolutionized aviation safety, and its core principles have stood the test of time, proving that sometimes the best solutions need only incremental improvements rather than complete reinvention.

In biological control, though, researchers are likely trying to account for unique environmental variables and potential unforeseen impacts. They might be using newer technologies and methodologies that weren't available in the 1930s, which could offer new insights or opportunities.

It's a balance, isn't it? Maintaining what's tried and true while cautiously exploring new solutions. Your experience in avionic systems probably gives you a unique perspective on the value of enduring, reliable technology. It sounds like you've had quite an impactful career!

If you ever want to share more stories from your career, I'd love to hear them. Aviation is fascinating!

Computer not ready for Windows 11? A BIOS update may help

In October this year Windows 10 will go end of life. Because of new hardware requirements for Windows 11, many current computers are not compatible and cannot be upgraded to Windows 11.

But what if your computer is not that old (say 5 years or less)? One of the requirements for Windows 11 is TPM (Trusted Platform Module). Prior to Windows 11 this was rarely used and many motherboard manufacturers had this option disabled by default.

I had a computer which I had built about 4 years ago and it was telling me it could not be updated to Windows 11. Now there are other requirements which have to be met (the type of processor, amount of memory, etc) but this computer met all those so I suspected it was the TPM requirement which was the issue.

I checked the motherboard manufacturer's website and there were several BIOS updates released since I had built the computer. I updated to the most recent and now have the green light to update to Windows 11. Checking the BIOS I can see the TPM option has been turned on. For now I am leaving it on Windows 10 but at least I can upgrade when I am ready.

BIOS (or now more accurately called EUFI) is a low-level operating system built into the motherboard. Its job is to check and initially configure all hardware and if everything is OK, start the Windows boot. If something goes wrong with BIOS/EUFI the whole computer can be rendered inoperable so a BIOS/EUFI update is not something to do unless you must. If it is not done correctly or something goes wrong in the process, it can be disastrous. However if your computer is not that old and you think such an update may extend its life rather than having to purchase a new computer, it may be worthwhile consulting a computer technician to see whether a BIOS/EUFI update would be possible.

Disabling Copilot in Microsoft 365

Last year Microsoft introduced Copilot (an AI assistant) into Microsoft 365. Australia was one of their test markets and it has now been rolled out worldwide. You will see the Copilot icon at the top of a new document and in the left margin at the start of each new paragraph. It is also available as an icon on the Ribbon when on the Home tab.

There was significant backlash since Microsoft did not provide a means to easily turn off the option for those who did not want it. In January this year, Microsoft provided an update which allowed it to be turned off in Word. In February, I noticed the disable feature is now available in Excel. At the moment there is no disable option in Powerpoint but I understand Microsoft is working on it.

You must disable Copilot in each individual app. For example, start Word. Without opening or starting a new document, click on **Options** (left column, at the bottom). Look for **Copilot** in the **Options Menu** (left column, fourth from the top). Click on Copilot and then remove the check mark from **Enable Copilot**. Click **OK** and then exit and restart Word. Copilot should be gone when you start a new document. You should also notice the Copilot icon on the Ribbon is greyed out.

If you have the latest update, you should be able to follow the same process to remove Copilot from Excel. At the time of writing, there is no disable option in Powerpoint but keep checking. If the release from Microsoft is accurate it should be available soon.

One thing to consider: the recent price increase for Microsoft 365 was partially justified by Microsoft due to the inclusion of Copilot. So if you disable it or never use it, is it worth the extra money?

It is possible (for a limited time, according to Microsoft) to downgrade to what they are calling 'Classic'. This removes Copilot and reduces the subscription price. You cannot actually purchase this version but if you have a current recurrent subscription, you can downgrade to it. Details are at [this](#) Microsoft site.

Downloading video from YouTube

Sometimes it can be helpful to download a video from YouTube so you can view it offline. Maybe it is a DIY tutorial you want to refer to or you may want to watch where you do not have an Internet connection.

There are a number of programs which will do this but one of the best I have found and free with no annoying 'extras' is [YouTube Downloader HD](#).

I usually grab the portable version since it does not need to be installed and I can easily move the whole thing to a USB and to another computer if I need to (it is all self-contained in its folder). It will download as a .zip file so the first thing to do is go to where you have downloaded it (usually the Downloads folder), right click and select **Extract all**. This will create a new folder with the program inside. You could then throw the original .zip file away if you want. If you download the installer version, you will need to double-click on the downloaded file to begin the installation.

Open the YouTubeDownloaderHD program. You may get a Windows Smart Screen warning. You should always be cautious when you get such warnings but in this case the program is perfectly safe. Click on **More info** and you should get a second screen. Click on **Run anyway**.

Find the video you wish to download.

Copy the address for the video from the address bar of your browser. Then switch to YouTube Downloader HD – you should be able to just click on its icon on the Taskbar if it is already running.

When YouTube Downloader HD comes to the fore, you should see the address for the video already in the Video URL: box. If it is not, paste the address there. Click the **Add to Download Queue** button and the name of the video should appear in the **Video Title** section.

You can copy the address for multiple videos if you wish and add each to the download queue.

Click the **Browse** button to select a location for the downloaded file(s). Once you are ready, click the **Download** button and YouTube Downloader HD should go out and begin to download each video in the queue. If it cannot find a version of the video at the resolution you have requested, it will look for a lower quality version.

Be aware that, due to restrictions in YouTube, not all videos are able to be downloaded. If YouTube Downloader HD is unable to download a video then that video is protected by YouTube or the original author.

Extracting audio from a downloaded YouTube video

In the article above I described how to download a YouTube video using YouTubeDownloaderHD. Sometimes it is not really the video you want but the audio – perhaps it is a song.

The program you need is [Easy Audio Extractor](#). Like YouTubeDownloaderHD, this is a free program with no hidden 'gotchas'.

Click on the **Free download** button. Again I usually choose the portable version for the same reasons described in the previous article. If you download the portable version (.zip file) you will need to extract it by right-clicking and then selecting **Extract all** from the pop-up menu. If you downloaded the installer version, double-click the downloaded file to begin the installation.

Use YouTubeDownloaderHD to download the video(s) you want. With all videos downloaded, start Easy Audio Extractor. If you get a Windows Smart Screen warning, click on **More info** and then **Run anyway**. You should always be cautious when you get such warnings but in this case the program is perfectly safe.

Use the **Browse** button to go to the location the videos were downloaded and select one video for audio extraction (unfortunately this program will only do one file at a time – there is no batch option). You can opt to save the output (audio) file to the same location as the original video which is probably the simplest; otherwise you can save the audio file to another location.

You can change the **Audio Options** if you wish. I usually select **Convert to MP3 - 256kbps**. That is a pretty good compromise for compatibility, file size and audio quality. If you want higher quality select the 320kbps option. Click the **Extract** button and the audio will be extracted from the video file and saved as an MP3.

Potty History

Chevalier de Saint-Georges Part 2

Again the Secret Agent

Early August 1789 Saint-Georges was sent by on another secret mission to London for his employer, the Duke of Orléans. Saint-Georges stayed at an expensive hotel on Jermyn Street which later became patronized by French refugees. Saint-Georges had the idea of establishing himself in England and was entertaining himself lavishly. His assignment was to stay close to the Prince of Wales, known for his excessive lifestyle. On 15th August, the Prince took Saint-Georges to his Marine Pavilion in Brighton for a fencing match. He also took him fox hunting and to the races at Newmarket. The Duke, having found himself in trouble in Paris, came to England and took over as the Prince's companion.

The Revolutionary Soldier

On 22nd May 1790 when the right to declare war was given to French Revolutionary National Assembly, St. Georges decided to serve the Revolution as a citizen-soldier. But not even his military duties in the Garde Nationale could prevent St. Georges from giving concerts. Once again he was building an orchestra which, according to the announcement in the paper, "Will give a concert every week until Easter." At the conclusion of the last concert, the mayor of Lille placed a crown of laurels on St. Georges' brow and read a poem dedicated to him.

Within two years Saint-Georges had risen to the rank of Colonel and commanded the company of infantry volunteers that held the line after the French cavalry had been routed in a fight with the Austrians at Tournai. In the same year the National Assembly established a non-white unit, the American Legion, later known as the Légion de Saint-George. In April 1793 the city of Lille was successfully defended by Saint-Georges against the monarchists. However, his coloured troops were forced to camp outside the city walls.

It was hard to work out what was happening in the following years; in May 1793 Saint-George was called to Paris to give evidence against the monarchists, but within a month (during which he performed a requiem by Gossec) he was himself accused of misuse of government funds; and the Légion de Saint-George was disbanded. In September 1793 Saint-Georges and ten of his officers were dismissed.

He was then arrested without specific charges and held in various prisons. Early in December 1793 he was condemned for being involved in non-revolutionary activities such as music events, but not much is known about a trial; maybe there never was one. He was released after eleven months on 24th October 1794 and asked to be reinstated in the army on 3rd April 1795. One month later he was arrested again, when the White Terror was sweeping the country, but released on 15th May.

On 15th October 1795 there was street fighting in Paris between the monarchists and the republicans. Napoleon won victory for the outnumbered republicans by placing forty cannons, loaded with grapeshot, to take out the advancing monarchist forces. This was the start of Napoleon's rise to power.

On 19th October all the officers in the army, including the ones who had been dismissed, had to specify to the Committee of Public Safety where they were on the days around this crucial event. On 24th October Saint-Georges was dismissed again. On Sunday 25th October the National Convention declared itself dissolved and voted for a general amnesty for "deeds exclusively connected with the Revolution". A slimmed down government (the Directoire) started working and appointed Napoleon as General in Chief of the Interior and, on 2nd March 1796, of the Army of Italy.

On 3rd May 1797, Saint-Georges tried to rejoin the army and signed his petition "George". He wrote:

"I continue to show loyalty to the revolution. Since the beginning of the war, I have been serving with relentless enthusiasm, but the persecution I suffered has not diminished. I have no other resources, only to restore my original position."

However, this application to the Directoire failed.

All this strife seems to have worn him out. Saint-Georges died in 1799 at the age of 53, from sepsis caused by an ulcerated bladder, having been largely forgotten by the society he had served and entertained. For centuries, his contributions were overshadowed by the prejudices of his era. However, in recent decades, his music has been rediscovered, and his story has inspired renewed interest.
