Recipe of the Month

Peperonata

This is a tasty Italian side dish – can be served hot or cold.

It's not well known in Australia, but is simple to cook.

Ingredients:

- 4 to 5 Mixed Red and Yellow Peppers
- 2 Hot Banana Peppers (Optional)
- 3 Tablespoons Olive Oil
- 1 Medium Onion
- Salt & Pepper
- 2 Garlic Cloves Minced
- 400g Chopped Tomatoes (or tin) + 300ml tomato juice to make up
- Fresh Chopped Parsley

Directions:

Deseed peppers and slice into 25mm strips.

Slice the onion into thin slices and cut these slices into quarters.

Heat the olive oil in a large, heavy pan, and add the onions and peppers.

Cook for about 10 minutes on medium heat, stirring frequently, until both the onions and peppers have softened and taken on some colour. Add the garlic.

Add the tomatoes with juice and reduce heat to a simmer.

Season with salt and pepper and cook for an additional 30 to 40 minutes, adding more juice if the mixture seems to be drying out too much.

Add the parsley and cook for an additional 5 minutes.

Taste once more and adjust seasonings if needed.

Tech Talk

My Electric Car

I have been planning for some time to switch to an electric car in the next couple of years, both because it would be a zero-emission vehicle and because I believe electric cars will become standard and the value of petrol cars will drop to about zero. But the failure of my Impreza air conditioning meant that I would need to spend about \$3000 to have it repaired when the hot season commenced – the car was not designed to ventilate properly with the windows open. So it made sense to expedite the changeover and trade in the Subaru in September.

Since I had heard good reports of MG (Saic Motor) cars I chose to buy the MG4 Excite which has a fully charged range of 300km around town. Using power from my solar panels (or from the grid) through a standard 15A power socket the car takes 25 hours to charge from flat to full (the charge lead only delivers 2KW and the battery is 51KWH). In practice it goes on charge during the day when I am at home; this adds about 20KWH or 120km of travel. But my doctor, who drives a Tesla, advises me that some electricity suppliers offer night rates of 6c/KWH, and that would allow a full charge for \$3 – as against \$15 at the full rate.

Being a new car, it has numerous bells and whistles that I find useful, including self-steering (as part of the smart cruise control) when in stop-go traffic. But an unexpected feature is that, since the air conditioner does not depend on an engine compressor, it can be turned on remotely (there's an app for that) when it has been left in an exposed car park while shopping. The app also includes “find my car” and reports on the recharging status.

Its acceleration is amazing – 0-100Km/hr in eight seconds (my Impreza took ten seconds, the first two being the time it required to spin up the engine). The batteries give it a very low centre of gravity, so it is remarkably stable; and its inertia means that it can pass over speed bumps without jumping.

Keyboard locked by Filter Keys

No matter how long you have worked with computers, problems can still arise which leave you scratching your head. One such case recently was a brand-new laptop where the keyboard would not accept any key press. No keys were working. At first I thought it was a hardware issue and the laptop would need to be returned under warranty.

However since the laptop was brand new with no user data or programs loaded, I decided to do a reset. This returns the laptop to a fresh Windows state and ensures that any changes made (deliberately or inadvertently) are wiped out. Once the reset was complete, the keyboard was working perfectly.

On further investigation, it appeared the owner had changed some of the setting in the **Ease of Access** settings. These settings are designed to assist people with disabilities to use a computer. Some of these settings impact the way the keyboard works. One, *Filter Keys*, has the unintended consequence of ‘locking’ the keyboard and making it appear unresponsive.

This article explains what Filter Keys are and how to turn the feature off in Windows 11.

For Windows 10, go to **Settings→Ease of Access→Keyboard**. You will see a toggle to turn on or off Filter Keys (it should be off by default). I would also suggest taking the tick out of the box beside the shortcut key. Filter Keys could be turned on inadvertently by something resting on the Shift key on the keyboard.

Unless you need them, I would also suggest turning off all the other keyboard modifiers on this page and their shortcuts – I have had Sticky Keys cause problems for people when it has been accidentally turned on.

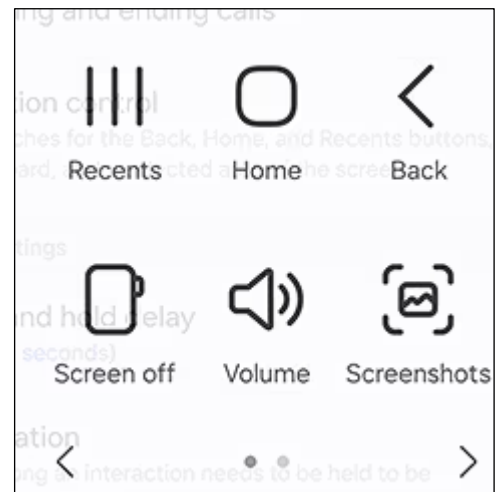
Samsung Accessibility

Phil's article discussed an unfortunate side effect of an accessibility feature in Windows. But Samsung have a feature whose side effects, I find, greatly improves my use of my tablet.

Their Assistant menu is a floating button with quick shortcuts for various functions, including taking screenshots, going to the home screen, and accessing the notification panel. Most of its functions bypass the built-in methods using multiple physical buttons or complex swipes.

Once you have activated it you just tap it to open the menu as shown on the right. The Recents is more reliable than swiping up – sometimes you find that you have closed the current app in the process; and Screenshots is otherwise started by simultaneously pressing Power and Volume Down on the side of the device – but there you are quite likely to turn the device off instead.

The two arrows at the bottom switch between two sets of functions. The Back arrow replaces swiping left – which again can have unintended results.



Activating the Assistant Menu

- Open Settings: Swipe down from the top of your screen and tap the gear icon to open the Settings app (or open it from your home screen if it is there)
- Go to Accessibility: Scroll down and tap on Accessibility.
- Select Interaction and dexterity: On the Accessibility screen, find and tap on Interaction and dexterity.
- Turn on Assistant menu: Locate Assistant menu and tap on the toggle to turn it on.

Editing the Assistant menu

There are a range of functions beyond the default sets, and you can change them around by tapping on “Select Assistant menu items” just below the activation toggle and then dragging and dropping items to and from the store below.
